- <u>Use:</u> This outstanding white Trumpet made its debut in 1937 and over the years has continued to win awards—the most recent in 1995—an Award of Garden Merit from the Royal Horticultural Society. Beds, rock gardens, in patio planters, and woodland garden. It was selected for its distinctive color and the speed and ease with which it grows and multiplies. We find it to truly be the easiest bulb to plant in the garden.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full-part sun. Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Drought tolerant once established.
- *Growth:* Grows 15-17" tall.
- Hardiness: Zone 4-8. Perennial. Bulb.
- Foliage: Deciduous. Do not cut off the leaves after flowering.
- <u>Flower:</u> The ivory cup turns pure white soon after opening, making an eye-catching display both in the border and in naturalized sweeps. We're told this variety is among the best of the class for gardens in the South. Midseason.
- Planting density: 6 inch apart, 5 per sq.
 ft.
- Planting depth: 8 inches to base of the bulb.
- Best planted in a mass of 30 or more for dramatic effect.
