

Grape Galaxy Lenten Rose



**A must for
color in the

***Helleborus orientalis* 'Grape Galaxy'**

- **Use:** Hellebores are the harbingers of spring, blooming for six weeks or more beginning in late winter. They are often flowering during the Christian season of Lent, from which they get their common name, Lenten Rose. This is the perfect plant for naturalizing in moist, woodland areas where its extensive root system will spread as far as it is allowed.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Part sun-shade. Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Good drainage is a must. Do not over-water in warmer months once established as they are pretty drought resistant.
- **Growth:** Grows 18-20" tall and wide; multiplies well.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 4-9; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Evergreen, virtually problem free. Older leaves can be cut back in late August to showcase winter blossoms better.
- **Flower:** Grape Galaxy Lenten Rose is covered with large, 3½ inch blooms in late winter. Rich dusky-purple petals are heavily speckled with deeper grape tinted flecks. Bright green centers add the perfect complement for color that awakens the senses. Blooms last over 2 months.
