

Daylily 'Prarie Blue Eyes'



Hemerocallis 'Prarie Blue Eyes'

- **Use:** To date there are no true blue daylilies - but with hybridizers working hard, that won't be the case forever. Until that day, Prairie Blue Eyes, a heavy blooming lavender daylily with a bluish halo, is our top choice. This award winner was created by one of the great masters, James Marsh, and competes with the best of them, producing up to an amazing 25 buds per stem. Performs best in moderate to warm climates with good disease resistance.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full- part sun (but must be 5-6 hours of afternoon sun) . Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Do not give too much nitrogen or they will not produce flowers. Once established needs only occasional water.
- **Growth:** Growing to a height of 28" and a plant spread of 12-24".
- **Hardiness:** Zones 3-9; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Semi-evergreen.
- **Flower:** Flowers are 5 1/2" across, lavender-blue ruffled petals, contrasting green throats, and sport a light seer suckered texture. Mid-season bloomer.



While it may not be exactly "blue", blooms are an attractive lavender/purple accented by a clear yellow throat.
