Rosa 'Louis Philippe'

- **Use:** Also known as Cracker Rose is a long time favorite in the Deep South where it thrives and is quite trouble free. It was introduced into Texas from France in 1834. The 2-3 inch wide double flowers are red with shades of pink are very fragrant and occur over a long period. It is surprisingly tolerant as to site and soil but deserves a good spot in every old southern garden.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full to part sun. They must have well-drained soils, so if you have red clay you must amend it. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry.
- **Growth:** Grows 5-6' tall and 3-4' wide.
- **Hardiness:** **Zone** 7-11; Shrub
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. Resistance to black spot leaf disease and powdery mildew as long as they are not overhead watered.
- **Flower:** Red, fully double blooms with a strong, sweet fragrance.
