

Bouquet Dill



Save money by growing your own herbs & vegetables! Early to flower with large seed heads. Excellent in pickles and used to flavor many other foods.

Anthem graveolens 'Bouquet'

- **Use:** In addition to providing aromatic seeds and foliage, dill will brighten your garden with its yellow-green flowers in spring and fall. It is a warm-season annual, but really loves mild weather—not too hot, not too cold. With its slender stem and delicate leaves, it makes a good mid- to back-of-the-border addition to your garden. Plant dill in a spot where it can easily reseed. Providing a tangy addition to pickles, salad dressing and fish dishes, fresh dill is available at markets during the summer and early fall while dried dill is available throughout the year.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full to part sun.
- **Growth:** While typical dill grows to a height of 2 to 4 feet.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 2-11 Annual/Herb; Can be planted in spring, summer, or fall. Reseeding
- **Foliage:** Its green leaves are wispy and fernlike and have a soft, sweet taste.
- **Flower:** Early flowering plants produce large blooms, seed umbels, and foliage on long stems, making Bouquet the preferred dill for cut-flower use and pickling. Edible Flowers: The flowers are used to garnish potato salad, green salads, and pickles. When broken into florets, they can be mixed into a cheese spread or omelet.
