## Citrus Cocktail Key Limequat & Meyer Lemon Tree





## Citrus x meyeri and Citrus x floridana

- <u>Use:</u> Are you short on space? Love to confuse your friends? Well, this fruit cocktail tree with grafted Meyer lemon and Key Limequat on the same tree is a real conversation starter! A key limequat is a citrus hybrid that's a cross between a key lime and a kumquat. The fruit is small, juicy, and has a sweet rind. Protect from frost.
- <u>Exposure/Soil</u>: Full sun. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry. Always hungry citrus need a lot of fertilizer. Soil drainage is very important. They need an excellent location with very warm southern exposure and protection from cold winds is ideal. If indoors needs VERY HIGH light and humidity.
- **Growth**: Moderate growing 8 to 10 ft. tall, 12 ft. wide; smaller in containers.
- *Hardiness:* Zone 9-10, must be grown indoors in winter below 50 degrees for reliable fruit production.
- *Foliage*: Evergreen, glossy green foliage.
- *Flower:* Fragrant 1" white flowers, We love the fragrance
- of the blossoms!
- <u>Fruit</u>: Meyers are naturally sweeter than standard lemons and ripen over several months, not all at once, so you have more time to enjoy them. Key Limequats have the sweet flavors of limes and oranges with a tart aftertaste. Their unique flavor is perfect for cooking with, as well as adding to drinks to give your favorite recipes some extra zest.
