- <u>Use</u>: A highly adaptable and low-maintenance pomegranate tree! This delightful variety, Afganski, is a favorite among pomegranate enthusiasts, and it's no wonder why. With its consistent cropping and high yield, you'll be treated to an abundance of very large, red fruits. But it's not just about quantity—the Afganski Russian pomegranate boasts a slightly tart flavor that will tantalize your taste buds. Performs especially well in the high humidity of the Southeastern U.S.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full to part sun. Soil should be well-drained. Acidic soil is preferred, though it can tolerate a wide variety of soils. As long as it is properly established, it is moderately drought tolerant.
- **Growth:** Growing up to 10 feet tall and wide with a naturally rounded shape. It can be grown as a large shrub or "limbed up' to form a small tree.
- <u>Hardiness</u>: Zone 7-10; Tree/ Small shrub Plants are easily hardy to 0° F. once established and with consistent summer moisture will ripen pomegranates in most climates.
- Foliage: Deciduous. Small green leaves.
- **Flower:** Produces sweet, slightly tart fruit. It fruits consistently, giving you an ample supply to eat during the season.

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
