Vitis rotundifolia 'Cowart'

- **Use:** When this self-pollinating grapevine bears fruit in September, you'll be rewarded with massive deep-blue-black grape clusters with sweet flavor. One of the best and most productive muscadines. Good pest and disease resistance, too! 17% sugar with an excellent flavor. The vine is very vigorous and produces many large clusters of medium size fruit. Ripens early season. Succulent fruit has a delicious flavor and is great for nearly every home use--juicing, jams, jellies and eating fresh. Vigorous vines produce eagerly and are disease resistant. .
- **Exposure/Soil:** Grow in full sun. Muscadine grapes grow well on a wide range of soils but best results are obtained from well-drained sandy loams with a pH of 5.5 to 6.5. They will not tolerate low, wet ground.
- **Growth:** Plant in full sun at 15-20 ft. apart on strong trellises.
- **Hardiness:** 7-10; Vine
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. Dark green above and green tinged yellow beneath, the leaves are glossy on both sides, becoming firm and subglabrous at maturity.
- **Flower:** Big bunches of blue-black grapes! Pluck off the largest, fruitful muscadine grape ever! Grapes ripen in mid-September. Print out more information from our Plant Info page on our website.
