String of Dolphins



This rare succulent is a great addition to your collection! The leaves look like dolphins that trail down thin

stems. In the fall, watch for white blossoms that smell like • cinnamon.





Senecio(Curio) peregrinus

- <u>Use:</u> A rare trailing succulent that's making waves around the world! The leaves lining its string-like stems really look like dolphins leaping off the plant, making it a true novelty in the natural world.
- Exposure/Soil: To prevent rot, use well-draining pots and soil and only water when the soil is dry. Keep the soil even drier during winter dormancy. To grow a lush, full cascade of dolphins, regularly prune the stems and replant the cuttings back in the same pot. Make sure that all parts of the trailing mass get sunlight and, if possible, move the plant outdoors to a covered porch or patio each summer.
- <u>Growth</u>: Grows 12" tall and trails down. Spreads more over time, but not invasive.
- *Hardiness:* Zone 10-11; Houseplant/ Annual
- <u>Foliage</u>: Evergreen if kept indoors. Each arched leaf grows two small points which make this plant look uncannily like a pod of frolicking dolphins.
- **Flower:** If properly cared for, it can send up bloom stalks with pompom-like clusters of tiny white flowers.
