This plant filters pollutants from the air while releasing oxygen. With this plant in your home, you breathe cleaner air. among the top ten air purifying plants for indoor use.

Epipremnum aureum 'Jade'

- <u>Use</u>: The graceful and forgiving Jade Pothos is an indoor hanging plant that can climb, transforming into a lush cascade of greenery. The Jade Pothos is a solid choice for your home or office because it is beautiful and easy to care for in the home. They are attractive, durable and easy to grow vines that have smooth, leathery, heart shaped leaves with distinctive marbling alternating along rope-like green stems.
- <u>Exposure/Soil</u>: All this easy-care plant needs is water and bright indirect light to look its best! It can tolerate low light for long periods but is periodically exposed to at least 4 hours of indirect sunlight daily. This plant is toxic if ingested. Keep away from pets and small children. It may also cause skin irritation. Watering the plants from time to time is crucial— especially during the hot season. However, overwatering can also kill them. That's why you need to keep the balance. Poke the soil with your forefinger, and see if the top inch is already dry, then that is the right time to water. They are prone to "wet feet," and there are two main culprits. These are overwatering and poor drainage. So, doing finger testing before watering is essential to prevent root rotting. You'll know eventually if you are overwatering your plants.
- <u>Growth</u>: Will continue to grow in the pot and will need repoting in the following year likely. They also make excellent hanging plants, but they will never reach their full potential unless they are allowed to climb upright on a totem pole. Totems give the plant's air roots something to attach to for support and they could grow up to 10' tall.
- <u>Hardiness</u>: Zone 10-12, Annual, Houseplant Can not tolerate temps below 55 degrees without damage.
- **Foliage:** Shiny, heart-shaped leaves in shades of green.
- <u>Flower:</u> When it comes to cultivated pothos, flowers do not exist. However, if grown in the wild, it will flower once it reaches the mature phase.
