

Pearls & Jade Pothos



This plant filters pollutants from the air while releasing oxygen. With this plant in your home, you breathe cleaner air.

They are attractive, durable and easy to grow vines that have smooth, leathery, heart shaped leaves with distinctive marbling alternating along rope-like green stems. Pothos vines are among the top ten air purifying plants for indoor use.

Epipremnum pinnatum 'Pearls 'n Jade' / Scindapsus aureus

- **Use: (AKA -'N'Joy' Pothos)** Among the most popular houseplants for their versatility and easy care. Its size is petite, but it can be a lush green plant perfect for your home. These plants are a superior clone of Marble Queen, but with smaller foliage.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Watering the plants from time to time is crucial—especially during the hot season. However, overwatering can also kill them. That's why you need to keep the balance. Poke the soil with your forefinger, and see if the top inch is already dry, then that is the right time to water. They are prone to "wet feet," and there are two main culprits. These are overwatering and poor drainage. So, doing finger testing before watering is essential to prevent root rotting. You'll know eventually if you are overwatering your plants.
- **Growth:** Will continue to grow in the pot and will need repotting in the following year likely. They also make excellent hanging plants, but they will never reach their full potential unless they are allowed to climb upright on a totem pole. Totems give the plant's air roots something to attach to for support and they could grow up to 10' tall.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 9-11, Annual, Houseplant Can not tolerate temps below 55 degrees without damage.
- **Foliage:** Its waxy green leaves have streaks and patches of white, cream, and light green, creating a bright and striking foliage plant. Pearls and Jade have narrower oval leaves with heart-shaped bases. If you place it in low light, you will notice more variegation of the yellow-green and dark green combinations.
- **Flower:** When it comes to cultivated pothos, flowers do not exist. However, if the pothos grows in the wild, it will flower once it reaches the mature phase.
