## Dottie Calathea





This plant filters pollutants from the air while releasing oxygen. With this plant in your home, you breathe cleaner air.



This plant is considered non-toxic, therefore safe around children and pets.

## Goeppertia insignis /Calathea roseopicta 'Dottie'

- <u>Use</u>: A chic, colorful houseplant for adding a splash of pink to your home or office, Calathea Dottie features rich green-purple leaves variegated with a band of hot pink. Leaves move during the day towards light. Not only will the Calathea Dottie add a pop of color to your space, but it's also known for its air-purifying abilities, making it the perfect plant for anyone looking to breathe a little easier. So if you want a plant that's both a statement piece and a workhorse, the Calathea Dottie is the one for you.
- Exposure/Soil: Prefers bright, indirect light. It can tolerate some lower light conditions, but avoid direct sunlight, as it can scorch the leaves. Make sure you don't have chlorine in your water, so using filtered water is best to avoid brown leaf tips. Calathea wants high humidity and high temperatures as well. Prefers high humidity levels. You can increase humidity by misting the leaves with water, using a humidifier, or placing a tray of water near the plant. Do not use leaf shine and filtered water is best. Don't be too worried if you notice the leaves beginning to curl or the stems of your Calathea Medallion drooping. These are signs of dehydration. It's important to pay attention to these indicators, but these hardy houseplants can bounce back within a day or so after receiving water.
- Growth: Can grow about 18 inches tall and wide in time.
- Hardiness: Zone 10 Houseplant, Annual
- **Foliage:** With its bold, dark purple leaves and pink accents, this plant is like the life of the party that demands attention the moment it walks in.
- Flower: Not known for flowers.
