

Lemon Lime Philodendron



Great as a houseplant in a sunny room or as a specimen on a shady Patio when temps are above 60 degrees. They do well growing indoors in typical household temperature and humidity levels, although providing with extra humidity will encourage larger and more vigorous growth.

Philodendron hederaceum 'Lemon Lime'

- **Use:** As a philodendron matures and the leaves spread out laterally, it makes an impressive floor plant. This is an easy-care plant that can adapt to all kinds of conditions if you keep it warm.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Grows well in bright indirect light. In lower light the leaves turn a darker green. Too much light or direct sun burns the leaves. Likes slightly acidic soil that is moist but not soggy. During the winter, water less often, keeping the soil barely moist. Do not let plant stand in water in saucer either. Feed monthly during the spring, summer, and fall with a water-soluble balanced fertilizer diluted to ½ the recommended strength. Too much plant food causes excess salt build up in the soil and can cause leaf burn.
- **Growth:** This plant, when grown indoors, can easily reach a height of 2-3ft and a leaf spread of 2-3 ft. It has stiff stems that are strong and firm enough to keep the plant growing straight up as it matures.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 11-12 Annual; Houseplant, must bring inside in the winter or when temps go below 50 degrees.
- **Foliage:** Dark green, heart-shaped lemony-lime leaf cascade in a lovely pattern.
- **Flower:** None that are noticeable in indoor cultivation.
