Philodendron 'Ring of Fire Gold'

- <u>Use:</u> Philodendron 'Ring of Fire' is believed to be a hybrid between Philodendron Tortum and Philodendron Wendlandii and was originally called 'Henderson's Pride'. The variation of colors on the new leaves can range from bright green to dark green. It is a rather slow-growing philodendron but well worth the wait.
- Exposure/Soil: Grows well in bright indirect light. In lower light the leaves turn a darker green. Too much light or direct sun burns the leaves or causes the deep green color to fade. likes moist but not soggy soil. During the winter, water less often, keeping the soil barely moist. Do not let plant stand in water in saucer either. Feed monthly during the spring, summer, and fall with a water-soluble balanced fertilizer diluted to ½ the recommended strength. Too much plant food causes excess salt build up in the soil and can cause leaf burn.
- <u>Growth:</u> As it matures, the leaves can reach more than 2-4 feet long (but don't worry, it's not a super-fast grower unless your house mimics the tropical Amazon;-). It has stiff stems that are strong and firm enough to keep the plant growing straight up as it matures.
- <u>Hardiness</u>: Zone 11 Annual; Houseplant, must bring inside in the winter or when temps go below 50 degrees.
- Foliage: Its leaves are a veritable color palette, featuring hues of gold, green, and red further embellished by unique striations, or vein patterns, that radiate from the center of the plant. This philodendron variety also sports a unique feature its leaves change color depending on light exposure. They can start as a bright yellow when new, then gradually turn to green with hints of red or deep orange, like flickering flames around the edges, living up to its 'Ring of Fire' name. Not for human consumption –keep away from kids and pets.
- Flower: Unlikely to flower.
