Sansevieria (Dracaena) trifasciata 'Gold Flame'

- <u>Use</u>: One look at this architectural plant and you'll surely be smitten. Why? Obviously, it is one gorgeous snake plant. Just look at those stunning leaves! Relatively slow growing, extremely low maintenance and dry tolerant. ideal for low light, and actually seem to thrive on neglect, making them ideal for those who travel or who love plants but don't have time to care for them. Sansevieria are also known to release oxygen at night, which most other plants release in the day, which also makes this an ideal choice for your nightstand. It earned the nickname "viper's bowstring hemp" due to the fact that the tough plant fibers were once used to construct bowstrings. Keep away from children and pets.
- <u>Exposure/Soil</u>: Low maintenance and can tolerate various lighting conditions, from low to bright indirect light. It prefers well-draining soil and infrequent watering, making it an excellent choice for those who want a low-maintenance houseplant. Drought tolerant; allow soil to dry completely between waterings
- **Growth:** Slow grower to 1.5'-2' tall and wide and slowly spreading in a rosette pattern.
- <u>Hardiness</u>: Zone 10-11 Houseplant, Annual Keep indoors when temps are below 60 degrees.
- **Foliage:** Erect, fleshy, sharply-pointed, sword-shaped leaves are deep green with light gray-green horizontal stripes. Leaves rise stiffly in a rosette from a thick rhizome
- <u>Flower:</u> Not known for flowers. Small, fragrant, greenish-white flowers bloom on mature plants in spring, followed by orange berries. Flowers and fruit rarely appear on indoor plants.
