- <u>Use:</u> Finally, a Foxglove that knows how to get up and GROW! - <u>Growth</u>: Grows quickly 2-4' tall or more and 18" wide
- <u>Hardiness</u>: 5-9; Perennial; reseeding biennial/ perennial; Make sure that heavy mulch is removed around the plants to allow seeds to drop and sprout.
- *Foliage:* Soft, fuzzy leaves.
- **<u>Flower:</u>** Colorful, prolific, and long-blooming, A strong, compact, and reliable show-stealer in the early-summer garden. The Foxglove 'Camelot® Laven-der' Digitalis plant will bloom in its first year and second, producing a mass of lavender flowers with burgundy speckled throats.
