

Mary Reed Daylily



A versatile and dependable perennial that is the backbone of the flower border and effective ground-cover for difficult sites.



Hemerocallis 'Mary Reed'

- **Use:** Need a small, front-of-the-bed daylily to mix with wave petunias, purple lantana or other short spreaders? Consider pretty Mary Reed. Her raspberry flowers stay open into the night rather than closing at sunset like so many daylilies do, so they're ideal for edging a patio where you relax in the evenings. She also reblooms in warmer regions. And like all daylilies, she's happy under a wide range of conditions.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full– part sun (but must be at least 5-6 hours of afternoon sun) . Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Do not give too much nitrogen or they will not produce flowers. Once established needs only occasional water. Divide every 3 years in late summer.
- **Growth:** Growing to a height of 12-14” and a plant spread of 24”. Flower stems are two and a half feet tall.
- **Hardiness:** Zones 3-9; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Semi-evergreen. Long thin leaves.
- **Flower:** A softly colored dwarf variety with rosy-purple petals and a prominent white mid-rib and reblooms.
