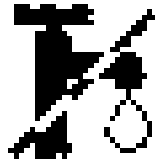


Persian Ruby Daylily



Daylilies can survive many harsh conditions that other plants cannot including: polluted city environments, slopes, poor and dry soils, near pavement that is salted in winter, and under Black Walnut trees (not affected by juglone).

- **Use:** An easily recognizable daylily that's a must-have for your garden! Deep purplish red, spoon-shaped flowers are massive – nearly 8" across. The large green throat is a nice contrast to the dark petals. Compared to the popular 'Ruby Spider', flowers are more purple in color. 'Persian Ruby' demands attention when it explodes with flowers in midsummer thanks to its high bud count.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full– part sun (but must be 5-6 hours of afternoon sun) . Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Once established needs only occasional water.
- **Growth:** Fast-growing and when in bloom, this mid-size clumper reaches 30 inches tall and 18-24" wide.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 3-9; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Semi-evergreen. The mounding strap like foliage adds a textural element to the garden when not in bloom.
- **Flower:** Spoon-shaped petals burst open with contrasting yellow and dark, blood-red coloring. The high bud count allows for prolific blooming all season, bedazzling visitors to your garden with plenty of flowers that open to nearly eight inches in width. Enjoyed by butterflies and hummingbirds as well. Early Midseason Bloomer, blooming in early June-July. Tetraploid with 44 chromosomes, twice as many as Diploids. Tetraploids tend to be bigger, stronger plants.

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
