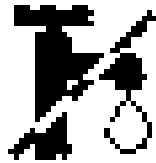


Clarence Bearded Iris



Iris 'Clarence'

- **Pale blue standards and flaring, ruffled, violet-blue falls with large, white beards**
- **Well-branched and budded with 7-10 buds**
- **Sweetly fragrant**
- **Blooms in late spring to early summer and then again in fall; highly recognized for its dependable rebloom**
- **Use:** No garden would be complete without Tall Bearded Irises. Though they have been grown for decades, new and improved hybrids continue to be developed every year and fabulous color combinations have been achieved. The Tall Bearded Irises bloom after the Dwarf Irises but before the Japanese and Siberian Irises. They are wonderful accent plants for late spring gardens.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Plant in full sun to partial shade, in fertile well drained soil. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Their thick roots drive down deeply, which makes them drought resistant (though they also thrive in damp soil) and great plants for holding steep banks in place. Each clump becomes huge, and when a group of them grows together, weeds can't grow in between.
- **Growth:** Grows 2-3' tall and 2' wide. Divide every 3-4 years. Space new container grown plants 18" - 24" apart.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 4-10; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. Narrow, lance-shaped leaves. After bloom, the grassy leaves stand erect and green through the growing season.
- **Flower:** Highly recognized for its dependable rebloom, this light blue bitone has quickly risen to prominence. The creamy white beards blend into the prominent white spots on the falls. Single-socketed buds yield only 5-6 sweet, fragrant blooms per stalk.
