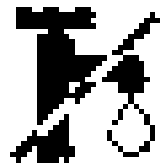


# Jurassic Park Iris



- **Canary yellow, broadly ruffled standards**
- **Blended purple falls with silver beards**
- **Blooms from late spring into early summer**

## *Iris 'Jurassic Park'*

- **Use:** No garden would be complete without Tall Bearded Irises. Though they have been grown for decades, new and improved hybrids continue to be developed every year and fabulous color combinations have been achieved. The Tall Bearded bloom after the Dwarf Irises but before the Japanese and Siberian Irises. They are wonderful accent plants for late spring gardens.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Plant in full sun to partial shade, in fertile well drained soil. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Their thick roots drive down deeply, which makes them drought resistant (though they also thrive in damp soil) and great plants for holding steep banks in place. Each clump becomes huge, and when a group of them grows together, weeds can't grow in between.
- **Growth:** Grows 2-3' tall and 2' wide. Divide every 3-4 years. Space new container grown plants 18" - 24" apart.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 4-10; Perennial
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. Narrow, lance-shaped leaves. After bloom, the grassy leaves stand erect and green through the growing season.
- **Flower:** Jurassic Park's colors (canary yellow standards and blended lavender-purple falls) are similar, but more intense, than those of its illustrious grandparent, Edith Wolford. Its broad ruffled form and large size are no doubt inherited from its parent, Best Bet. With such a distinguished background, it should be no surprise that it has been quickly recognized for its excellence. Winner of the President's Cup in 1996.
