- Use: A popular selection of our native inkberry holly noted for its attractive dark green foliage (hence the name 'Nigra') and compact habit. May sucker; excellent for damp sites. Excellent for use as a low hedge, in containers or in mass plantings. Makes a lush green background for flowering plants. Very little maintenance is needed.
- Exposure/Soil: Full sun-part shade. Well-drained soil, not soggy. Water the 1st two years for best growth. If it doesn't rain for 7-10 days, then water until established. For fastest growth use slow release fertilizer two times a year! Dislikes high pH soils.
- Growth: An easy to grow shrub reaching 3 to 4' tall and wide. the founda- •

- Foliage: Evergreen. Dark evergreen foliage. Foliage may turn purplish home! Tolin winter. erate: Rab-
- *Flower:* Greenish white flowers appear in spring, but are relatively inconspicuous. If pollinated, female flowers give way to pea-sized, jet black, berry-like drupes (inkberries as it were) which mature in early Wet Soil, Air fall and persist throughout winter to early spring unless consumed by local bird populations.
