
Scarlet Bells Henry's Rhodoleia



This is an uncommon shrub, in fact its a collectors item.

Rhodoleia henryi 'Scarlet Bells'

- <u>Use:</u> 'Scarlet Bells' begins to bloom in January and continues until April with pink rose-like blooms over top of dark green rounded foliage on this evergreen tree. 'Scarlet Bells' may reach up to 15 ft in 10 years. Give 'Scarlet Bells' morning sun with protection from the hot afternoon sun for best blooms, foliage, and growth rate. Super rare & extremely unique.
- <u>Exposure/Soil:</u> Fullsun to part shade. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Drought tolerant. Ensure adequate water in first year.
- <u>Growth</u>: Grows 10-15' tall and wide.
- <u>Hardiness</u>: Zones 7– 9; Shrub
- *Foliage:* Evergreen; Rounded, glossy leaves have silvery undersides.
- **<u>Flower:</u>** A member of the Witchhazel family, Hamamelidaceae, which makes it related to Loropetalum and Witchhazels. Flowers are amazing bell-shaped clusters of vibrant rose-pink to red petals measuring about 2-3" across. Flowers typically open in mid March in Georgia in Zone 8 continuing to mid April. Some gardeners state even with low 20°F nights, the flowers were not damaged.
