

Conoy Viburnum



- Highly floriferous & fragrant
- Great as a large hedge
- Fall foliage interest
- Deer resistant
- Attracts pollinators
- Tolerates clay soil
- Disease resistant



Viburnum × burkwoodii 'Conoy'

- **Use:** Ideal for use as an eye-catching specimen shrub or in groupings in landscape borders, home foundation plantings, and flowering shrub borders. Perfect in sunny or partially shaded woodland borders. A fine addition to white theme gardens, cottage gardens, wildlife gardens, and the Xeriscape (low water needs). LOADS of 3 inch diameter clusters with pink buds that burst open to lightly fragrant white flowers nearly cover the very deep green and glossy 2.5 inch long leaves in spring. In the winter the leaves take on a handsome purplish shade.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Full to part sun (best). Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry. Tolerant of all soils and positions as long as it is not too dry.
- **Growth:** Stays compact and grows to 4 to 5 feet tall and 7 to 8 feet wide.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 5-8; Shrub
- **Foliage:** Evergreen. The leaves are glossy, dark green, and opposite, and both the stems and foliage are finely pubescent. The foliage color of deep maroon provides fall interest. In warm southern climates, the leaves often remain on the plant throughout the winter.
- **Flower:** Creamy white flat-topped, umbel-like, and mildly fragrant flowers that appear in the spring. The flowers cover the shrub when in bloom, and they appear pink when closed but are primarily white when opened. If pollinated with another V. burkwoodii variety, in late summer and early fall the ripening clusters of one-third-inch long berries transition in stages from red to black as the fruit mature.

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
