

Orangeola Weeping Laceleaf Japanese Maple



To showcase its magnificence and beauty, a Japanese Maple is best used in the landscape as a focal point specimen to draw attention to a specific area of the home or landscape. That said, you can plant them in groupings of three or plant one on both sides of an entryway.

Acer palmatum dissectum 'Orangeola'

- **Use:** A season-long kaleidoscope of colors. Foliage changes from green to purple and then a brilliant shade of orange-red in the fall. Graceful, arching deciduous tree displaying deeply-lobed, finely-serrated leaves, giving an artistic lacy effect.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Prefers morning sun and afternoon shade in the South. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry. Will not tolerate soggy or extremely dry soil.
- **Growth:** Grows slightly taller than wide, unlike most weeping laceleaf Japanese maples. 4 ft. tall and 3 ft. wide in 10 years; up to 8 ft. tall at maturity.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 5-8, medium sized tree
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. The lacy, new growth emerges as a brighter red to orange as the older growth below is green. Then purple and orange.
- **Flower:** An abundance of flowers each spring that produce a multitude of seeds – called 'samaras'. The samaras hang down as little ornaments which adds to the overall look of this beautiful maple.
