Carya illinoensis 'Pawnee'

- **Use:** The most outstanding feature of 'Pawnee' is its large nut size combined with very early nut maturity. The tree bears an egg shaped nut with a thin shell within 5 to 7 years. Its large light golden kernels are just right for roasting.
- **Exposure/Soil:** Grow in full sun. Well-drained, rich soil. Needs zinc fertilizer or crop will fail. Will fail in poor red clay soils. RESEARCH IS NEEDED WHEN GROWING PECANS FOR CARE.
- **Growth:** They can grow up to 70' to 100', 55' spread.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 7-10; Tree.
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. This persimmon tree is a handsome ornamental with large leaves and can turn dramatic shades of yellow, orange and red in the fall.
- **Flower/ Fruit:** A cross of Mohawk and Starking Hardy Giant. The nuts have very early maturity which makes the Pawnee an attractive variety for the shorter growing seasons. Popular commercially grown. Harvest date around Sept 10th. Protandrous, pollen shed similar to Cheyenne.
