

Super Princess Dogwood



Once the leaves drop they make way for vibrant red berries that pop against the Super Princess Dogwood's stunning grey trunk. They fill the countryside with color while other plants are dull and brown during the winter. The showy red berries are a food source for birds, and invite them to perch in the branches. In exchange for a delicious snack the birds chirp and hop from branch to branch to entertain spectators.

- **Use:** Sporting an even more abundant amount of blooms in early Spring compared to the classic princess dogwood, the snow white color is sure to pop. Plant this in a distance at your favorite window and watch it dazzle you through the seasons!
- **Exposure/Soil:** Part sun-shade. Best when planted under other trees, but not too deep a shade or poor flowering. Moist, well-drained soil, but not soggy. Use slow release fertilizer two times a year. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry.
- **Growth:** Maturing at 15 to 30 (25 years) feet tall and 10 to 20 feet wide. They will flourish with unrivaled beauty without taking over the yard.
- **Hardiness:** Zone 5-9; Tree
- **Foliage:** Deciduous. The medium to dark green glossy leaves turn to outstanding shades of red to reddish purple with the arrival of cooler temperatures in fall. While this variety is not completely resistant to anthracnose, it was bred for increased resistance in comparison to the straight species.
- **Flower:** Super Princess has an extra heavy set of large flowers with bracts 4 to 5 inches across that cover the tree like snow in early to mid spring. The flowers glow in the landscape and will cause your garden to be the most beautiful one in the neighborhood. As with other flowering dogwoods, abundant clusters of deep red berries are displayed in fall persisting well into winter providing cool season interest and a delectable delight for the birds.

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
