
Kintzley's Ghost® Honeysuckle



Plant Natives

Lonicera reticulata 'P015S'

Use: This wild-looking plant is actually native to North America. Each season, it begins like any other honeysuckle, with typical dusty green leaves. As the season progresses, flower buds pop out like saucers. These rounded bracts look a lot like eucalyptus, but the flowers at the center feed native pollinators like hummingbirds! They turn into red berries in the fall, but won't become a nuisance like other honeysuckles. Due to its size and interesting seasonal changes, it makes an incredible specimen.

- *Exposure/Soil:* Prefers morning sun and afternoon, but will tolerate full sun with irrigation. Water regularly, when top 3 in. of soil is dry to start. Little water needed once established.
 - Growth: Fast-growing vine to 6 to 12ft. Long and 5' wide. Can also be pruned back to form a dense shrub 4 to 6 feet round or run on the ground as a groundcover..
- Hardiness: Zone 4a-8b, Perennial Vine or shrub
- foliage, flow-Foliage: Deciduous. Unique silvery foliage emerges as unusual flying saucerer, and berry like discs around the stem with a silvery-blue tint and adds stunning texture progression and unique interest to your garden.
 - *Flower:* It's covered with yellow trumpet flowers in late spring and early summer. While the flowers may not be fragrant, they attract pollinators nonetheless. In fall glistening red berries follow the flowers. Blooms on old wood.
